from ACCESS, St. Louis Public Library, November/December '90

You've heard of "Mr. Clean," but have you met "Mr. SLIC"? He's a 27-year-old library technician who at six feet looks more like a fullback than the creator of a special new department at the St. Louis Public Library. It's called St. Louis Information Center - SLIC for short.

A sharp-witted English literature major now commuting once a week to the University of Missouri at Columbia for a graduate library degree, "Mr. SLIC" is Matt Nojonen (pronounced No-ya-nin). Blessed with the kind of personality that even Dale Carnegie might envy, Nojonen was hired in 1988 to organize a resource center that could provide quick, accurate information about St. Louis' political, economic and social milieu.

From his niche behind the massive oak circulation desk at the Library's downtown headquarters, Nojonen began his task methodically calling every number listed in the <u>Municipal Directory</u>, the city government phone book. His mission was simple: to persuade all city offices to add SLIC to their mailing lists, so that he could build an up-to-date data base that would, via a computer index (SLIC-DEX), instantly yield a subject listing of all the materials accumulated.

Unfortunately, many whom he rang up were not so clear about Nojonen's objective as he was. At least, not at first. Some city offices had to be coaxed. But Nojonen can be as persuasive as a politician running for office, and as determined as Ralph Nader. Sometimes he played a waiting game. "My record was ten holds and seven transfers in a single office, he admits cheerfully. But eventually publications began to flow smoothly into Nojonen's cubicle. Currently, his information bank includes 65 subject entries, ranging from "Abuse and Abuse Services" through "Water". Nojonen became so captivated be the latter topic that he created a handy bookmark called "the Word on Water". It's chock-full of facts about water, including the news that the city of St. Louis pumps 440 million gallons a day, more than enough to fill 1,120 Olympic-size swimming pools.

This free bookmark and other SLIC "briefs" are available at Central Library and the neighborhood branches. Take home "St. Louis by the Numbers", for example to learn how many police officers the city has, how many vehicles, and a variety of other statistical facts of interest to marketing directors, salespeople, management consultants and the rest of us who are curious about our hometown.

Currently, Nojonen is preparing two more publications. One will tell you all you ever wanted to know about St. Louis' seven sister cities. The other is monthly "Current Awareness Services Report" for St. Louis Library banch managers.

While doing his homework for the latter project, he has been visiting the fourteen branch managers to determine how SLIC can better serve their specific needs. Barr Branch, for example, wants crime statistics for the area surrounding its location at 1701 S. Jefferson. Carondelet seeks to expand its already rich historical neighborhood holdings.


To accommodate Carondelet, Nojonen will photocopy references to this well-known community from thirty St. Louis periodicals that he regularly peruses and summarize them in a special report to the Library's manager in this neighborhood.

Nojonen also writes and edits a reference tool called "Ballot Book", which he turns to often in fielding numerous telephone questions daily. It zeroes in on election and voting information, and is updated regularly.

Nojonen is also tapping myriad other sources around town, including social organizations and regional planning groups, as he continues to expand his data base.

Last August, the St. Louis Public Library became an official depository for all City Hall publications, as a result of the passage of City Ordinance 62042. These new documents and papers will flesh out the Central Library's government holdings, which include U.S. publications from as early as the 1700s and Missouri state publications since the 1800s.

# Maplewood Public Library trades food

# for fines

During the week of December 17-22, 1990, the Maplewood Public Library accepted donations of food instead of money from patrons returning overdue materials. Over 150 canned and boxed goods were received during the food drive. The food was displayed in the library, and later delivered to the Maple Heights Service organization, a local food pantry.

Library Director, Terrence Donnelly, reported that the food drive was well-received by the community, and that many of those donating food had no overdue items, but simply came to the library to drop off a donation. He added that, to his knowledge, this was the first "Food for Fines" drive held in the St. Louis area.
