## Sara Parker named Missouri state librarian

Secretary of State Rebecca McDowell Cook has announced the appointment of Sara Ann Parker, currently commissioner of libraries and deputy secretary of education in Pennsylvania, as the new Missouri state librarian. Parker will begin her duties in mid-June.

Parker is a native Missourian who has 14 years of experience working in Missouri libraries. Before taking her current position in 1988, she served as Montana state librarian for six years and supervisor of regional library service systems coordination for the Colorado State Library. She also worked as coordinator of the Southwest Missouri Library Network in Springfield, as bookmobile director, adult services librarian, and assistant reference librarian at the Spring-field-Greene County Library, and as an administrative assistant at BarryLawrence Regional library in Monett.


Active in state and national professional associations, Parker is currently vice president/president-elect of the Chief Officers of State Library Agencies. She also has served as president of the Mountain Plains Library Association.

Her articles have been published in Wilson Library Bulletin, Colorado Libraries, the Journal of Library Administration, and in the books Librarians for the New Millennium (ALA, 1988) and Friends of Libraries Source Book (ALA, 1990).

She received the President's Public Service Award from the Nature Conservancy for her establishment of the Montana National Resource Information System. This model program serves state government, federal agencies in Montana, and the private sector.

In both Montana and Pennsylvania, Parker has promoted new technologies in library services, from Internet access and CD-ROM databases to the automation of libraries and the development of library teleconferences.

She was responsible for the establishment of a statewide library card in Pennsylvania as well as many innovative library services, among them a program in partnership with the American Association of Retired Persons to improve library services for older Pennsylvanians and a program called WORKPLACE, which serves


Sara Parker, Missouri's new state librarian more than 90,000 clients in public libraries. The program with AARP is unique in the nation and has received media coverage across the country.

She also has a long-standing interest and involvement in library literacy programming, collection development and legislative issues.

Parker holds a B.A. in political science from Oklahoma State University and an M.L.S. from Kansas State Teachers College (now Emporia State University). She did graduate work in political science at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and was an educational policy fellow at the Institute for Educational Leadership.

## BURCKEL NAMIED PRESIDENT-ELECT OF SOCIETY OF AMERICAN ARCHIVISTS

Nicholas C. Burckel, Pd.D., Asscociate Dean for Collections \& Services for the Washington University Libraries, has been elected vice president/president-elect of the Society of American Archivists (SAA). The Society, located in Chicago, is the largest professional archival organization in the world, with more than 3,000 individual and 500 institutional members.

Burckel, who has been Associate Dean for the Washington University Libraries since 1989, has been an active member of the organization since he was elected an SAA fellow in 1985. He has chaired and served on several committees, including the executive, nominating, professional standards, and programming committees. He also has served as president and vice president of the Midwest Archives Conference, and as a member of the Missouri Historical Records Advisory Board and the Bentley Fellows Advisory Committee, among other posts. Burckel's term as vice president begins at the Society's annual meeting in September, and he will assume the presidency in the fall of 1996.

As president-elect, Burckel said he plans to concentrate on building effective coalitions between the SAA and allied professions to improve their understanding of archives. He also plans to give SAA a more active voice in discussions of electronic record-keeping on campuses, in government, and within private organizations.
"It may be possible to attract funding to bring together software manufacturers, records creators, archivists and users, to examine the implications of electronic records for all," Burckel said. "We live in an information society. We must be able to influence it by active cooperation with other information providers and users. An outward looking approach is not only key to our success, it is essential to our survival."

Before coming to Washington University, Burckel was Assistant Vice Chancellor, Executive Assistant to the Chancellor, Associate Director of the Library/Learning Center, and Director of the Archives and Area Research Center at the University of Wisconsin, Parkside. He has edited or coauthored six books, 15 articles, and more than 100 reviews in archival, library, and historical journals.
