When the PNH Library was renovated in 1994, the staff hoped for sufficient funds to replace the existing tables and chairs. Such funds were not available, so alternative sources of funding were sought. A colleague from the academic library world suggested an adopt-a chair program such as theaters and colleges have used to replace worn-out furniture. With this suggestion and assistance from a furniture vendor the librarians developed a plan and designed a brochure.

Tables and chairs were both needed. With a goal of 25 tables and 100 chairs, the promotion sought donors of a minimum of $\$ 100$ for a chair. Tables could be adopted for $\$ 400$. Donors were encouraged to write an inscription to be engraved on a brass plate and affixed to the back of their chairs. Examples of inscriptions included:

The name of company or business
A high school graduate's name and class year
Appreciation of a respected teacher or administrator or parent
A memorial to a friend or relative
The Adopt-A-Chair proposal was presented to the PNH Parents Club Board. The Board voted to make a generous contribution toward the acquisition of the first grouping of tables and chairs. Additional funds have been forthcoming from parents, vendors, and staff.

One family bought a chair and had the names and class years of their four children listed on the brass plate. The orchestra students collected $\$ 100$ and donated a chair in honor of the orchestra teacher. A retiring administrator was honored with a chair in his name from his staff. The Class of 1975 made a generous donation in honor of 10 classmates who have died over the past 20 years. The donation will be acknowledged with a specially engraved plaque on the library memorial wall.

In addition to the brass plates on the chairs there is a large oak wall plaque with the names of all donors. Thus far, 18 companies and individuals have donated funds. The library has 16 new tables and 32 new chairs. Additional contributions come in occasionally, with the greatest amount around graduation. While the amount of furniture may seem modest, the tables and chairs have greatly improved the appearance of two seating areas of the library. A second high school in the Parkway District has recently begun an Adopt-A-Chair program to help refurbish their renovated library.

## Shirley Baker Appointed Vice Chancellor for Information Technology

Mark S. Wrighton, Chancellor of Washington University in St. Louis, has appointed Shirley K. Baker, Dean of University Libraries, to the newly-created position of Vice Chancellor for Information Technology. Baker will continue in her role as Dean of University Libraries.

In her new post, Baker will have responsibility for planning and coordinating the elaboration of the information infrastructure at Washington University. "I interpret this as a very broad focus to look at all of the technical processes by which we acquire, create, manage and disseminate information among members of the University community and with our external constituencies," Baker said.

Baker joined Washington University in 1989 as Dean of University Libraries. Previously, she had been Associate Director of Libraries for Public Services at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1982 to 1989. She was a Librarian at Johns Hopkins University between 1976 and 1982, and previously served as a Librarian at Northwestern University for two years following the completion of her master's degree in library science from the University of Chicago in 1974. Baker also holds a master's degree in South Asian languages and civilizations from the University of Chicago (1974) and an undergraduate degree in economics from Muhlenberg College (Allentown, Penn.), in 1965.

Her prior experience also includes working in computing for AT\&T and L.E. Myers Company of Chicago, and serving as a Peace Corps volunteer for two years in India.

Baker's involvement in the library profession includes leadership in the Association of Research Libraries' North American Interlibrary Loan/Document Delivery Project, chair of the board for the Missouri Library Network Corporation, and chair-elect of the Online Computer Library Corporation's (OCLC) Research Libraries Advisory Council.
